RIVERSIDE CITY COUNCIL MEETING: September 16, 2019

The Riverside City Council meeting opened at 6:30 pm in City Hall with Mayor Allen Schneider requesting roll call. Council members present were: Tom Sexton, Andy Rodgers, Bob Schneider Jr., Edgar McGuire, and Jeanine Redlinger.

Redlinger requested to add Dog Park Naming to agenda.

Motion by Sexton to approve agenda with Dog Park addition, Second by Schneider, passed 5-0.

Washington County Sherriff's report was presented by Lieutenant Randy Tinnes. Council discussed speed zones within City limits, and recent speed study results.

Schneider requested table of Camp Highland expenditure for recap report from Washington YMCA.

Rodgers moved to approve the minutes of September 3rd, 2019, and revised expenditures. Second by Redlinger, passed 5-0.

Council reviewed August Fire Dept. update.

Art Sweeting requested entrance road to his property east of Stutsman's, to develop a commercial site. Plans will be sent to P&Z for recommendation.

Bill Poch requested Council to consider additional storm drain tubing east of his driveway. McGuire moved to have MMS get estimate of ditch work addition, and agree to a 50/50 cost split with homeowner. Second by Redlinger, passed 5-0.

Dawn McCoy addressed Council on the re-zoning of Conservation Park.

Bill Stukey of PeopleService, Inc. presented August water and waste water report. Sexton moved to accept Visu-Sewer proposal for CCTV Inspection and Vactor sewer cleaning from Northern Heights through Kleopfer Street to lift station, at estimate price of \$7500. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

Rodgers moved to open Public Hearing on rezoning Conservation Park from A-1 Agricultural to P-1 Public at 7:15 p.m. Second by Sexton, passed 5-0.

Dawn McCoy expressed concern over placing a fence between her property and City.

There were no other written or oral comments.

Schneider moved to close Public Hearing at 7:22 p.m. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Sexton moved to pass Ordinance #091619-01 Amending Zoning map of the City of Riverside, rezoning Conservation Park from A-1 Ag to P-1 Public. Second by Schneider, passed 5-0.

McGuire moved to waive 2nd and final reading, and adopt Ordinance #091619-01. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

Rodgers moved to open the Public Hearing to rezone Hall Park Addition from R-2 Mixed Residential to P-1 Public at 7:25 p.m. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

There were no written or oral comments.

Sexton moved to close Public Hearing at 7:26 p.m. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

Schneider moved to pass Ordinance #091619-02 Amending Zoning map of the City of Riverside, rezoning 81 Pioneer Street from R-2 Mixed Residential, to P-1 Public. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Sexton moved to waive 2nd and final reading, and adopt Ordinance #091619-02. Second by Sexton, passed 5-0.

Rodgers moved to open the Public Hearing to rezone the Community Building, 81 E 1st Street, from P-1 Public, to C-2 Commercial at 7:28 p.m. Second by Schneider, passed 5-0.

Building owner, John Sojka, expressed approval of rezoning to City Administrator. There were no other oral or written comments.

Rodgers moved to close Public Hearing at 7:29 p.m. Second by Sexton, passed 5-0.

Schneider moved to pass Ordinance #091619-03 Amending Zoning map of the City of Riverside, rezoning 81 E 1st Street from P-1 Public, to C-2 Commercial. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Rodgers moved to waive 2nd and final reading, and adopt Ordinance #091619-03. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Sexton moved to open the Public Hearing to rezone 1184 Commercial Drive from C-3 Avenue of Saints Commercial, to C-2 Commercial at 7:31 p.m. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

There were no oral or written comments.

Rodgers moved to close Public Hearing at 7:32 p.m. Second by Sexton, passed 5-0.

McGuire moved to pass Ordinance #091619-04 Amending Zoning map of the City of Riverside, rezoning 1184 Commercial Drive from C-3 Avenue of Saints Commercial, to C-2 Commercial. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

Rodgers moved to waive 2nd and final reading, and adopt Ordinance #091619-04. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Sexton moved to allow City Administrator to attend Iowa League of Cities Fall Conference in Dubuque. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Steve Smith, Johnson County Refuse, presented Trash/Recycling Container program to Council. The new Agreement will be on next agenda. Earliest service switch date will be December.

McGuire moved to change garbage pick-up day from Tuesday to Monday starting in October. Second by Sexton, passed 5-0.

City Administrator Yancey presented offer to purchase City owned, old pump house property adjacent to 336 Blackberry.

Redlinger moved to pass Resolution #091619-05; Set date of October 21st, 2019 for Public Hearing to sell Parcel #04-08-355-015 on Blackberry Ave, at the regular City Council meeting, which begins at 6:30 p.m. Second by McGuire, passed 4-0, Schneider abstained.

Scott Pottorff, MMS Consultants gave Capital Project updates.

Rodgers moved to pass Resolution #091619-06, Approving Change Order #15 to Triple B Construction for HWY 22 project in the amount of \$1725.00, to add sub drain on the north side of HWY 22, east of Greene Street. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

McGuire moved to pass Resolution #091619-07, Approving Change Order #16 to Triple B Construction for HWY 22 project in the amount of \$1050.00, to adjust fire hydrant to grade at corner of HWY 22 and Schnoebelen Street. Second by Redlinger, passed 4-1, Sexton opposed.

Rodgers moved to pass Resolution #091619-08, Approving Change Order #17 to Triple B Construction for HWY 22 project in the amount of \$7280.00, to relocate water main at intersection of HWY 22 and Sycamore Street. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

McGuire moved to pass Resolution #091619-09, Approving Change Order #18 to Triple B Construction for HWY 22 project in the amount of \$6352.50, to change transition pavement sections at 3rd and 4th Streets from seal coat to asphalt paving. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

McGuire moved to pass Resolution #091619-10, Approving Change Order #19 to Triple B Construction for HWY 22 project in the amount of \$2062.50, to perform additional scarification of PCC pavement between Glasgow and Greene Streets. Second by Schneider, passed 5-0.

Redlinger moved to pass Resolution #091619-11, accept the Northern Heights revised development plans, reviewed by MMS Consultants. Second by McGuire, passed 4-1, Sexton opposed.

Dog Park name options were discussed. Redlinger moved to name the park as requested by Matt Butler, Ozzy's Dog Park. Motion died due to lack of second.

Phil Richman commented that Capt. Kirk's dog in the Star Trek Movie; Generations, was named Butler.

McGuire moved to use the name of "Butler's Dog Park". Second by Sexton, passed 5-0.

Council, Mayor, and Administrator comments were given.

Sexton moved to adjourn at 9:46 p.m. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

3. Schnoebelen moved and Kirkwood seconded to approve the agenda. Schnoebelen moved and Kiene seconded to approve the minutes of the August 27, 2019, meeting (correcting the date). Both motions were passed unanimously.

Dear WCRF Board of Directors:

I write on behalf of City of Riverside in support of the Washington County Public Health's proposal to the Washington County Riverboat Foundation for a grant to fund the Rethink Your Drink Washington County to reduce health disparities in the City of Riverside. We strongly support this grant application and the focus on reducing consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages among children and adolescents by increasing access to water where they naturally gather and play.

As an organization which the City of Riverside will work diligently with Washington County Public Health to reduce health disparities in the community and local youth organizations.

Through this letter, we acknowledge specific roles and responsibilities we will fulfill in this partnership. In the event this proposal is funded, we would expect our role in the Rethink Your Drink Washington County to include:

- Providing materials, supplies, and labor for the installation of water fountains in our community
- Provide signage recognizing WCRF as the funder for the water fountains
- Partner with Washington County Public Health's Wellness Coalition to promote better health and fight childhood and adult obesity.
- Matching funds of \$450.00 by the City of Riverside

Washington County Public Health will take responsibility to lead the Rethink Your Drink Washington County's initiative to increase access to water to children in order to reduce health disparities. In 2015, our Community Health Needs Assessment determined that obesity was a concern in Washington County especially among children. Additionally, we live in a dental shortage area. These bottle filling water fountains will allow all children to easily access water while playing in their community, which reduces consumption of sugar sweetened beverages, which reduces risk of childhood obesity and dental cares.

We look forward to working with you in eliminating health disparities in our community and achieving health equity.

(6) Any crossbreed of such animals which have similar characteristics to the animals specified above.

14. "Livestock" means an animal belonging to the bovine, caprine, equine, ovine or porcine species, ostriches, rheas and emus; farm deer as defined in Section 170.1 of the *Code of Iowa*; or poultry.

(*Code of Iowa, Sec. 717.1*)

15. "Offending animal" means a "vicious dog," an "illegal animal," or a "dangerous animal" as defined herein.

16. "Owner" means any person owning, keeping, sheltering, or harboring an animal (or allowing the keeping, sheltering, or harboring of an animal on the premises of said person).

17. "Pet" means a living dog, cat, or an animal normally maintained in a small tank or cage in or near a residence, including but not limited to a rabbit, gerbil, hamster, mouse, parrot, canary, mynah, finch, tropical fish, goldfish, snake, turtle, gecko, or iguana.

18. "Vicious dog" means:

A. Any dog which has attacked a human being or domestic animal one or more times, without provocation;

B. Any dog with a history, tendency or disposition to attack, to cause injury or to otherwise endanger the safety of human beings or domestic animals;

C. Any dog that snaps, bites, or manifests a disposition to snap or bite;

D. Any dog that has been trained for dog fighting, animal fighting, or animal baiting, or is owned or kept for such purposes;

E. Any dog trained to attack human beings, upon command or spontaneously in response to human activities, except dogs owned by and under the control of the Police Department, a law enforcement agency of the State or the United States or a branch of the armed forces of the United States.

55.02 ANIMAL NEGLECT. It is unlawful for a person who impounds or confines, in any place, an animal, excluding livestock, to fail to supply the animal during confinement with a sufficient quantity of food or water, or to fail to provide a confined dog or cat with adequate shelter, or to torture, deprive of necessary sustenance, mutilate, beat, or kill such animal by any means which causes unjustified pain, distress or suffering.

(*Code of Iowa, Sec. 717B.3*)

55.03 LEASHING. Any person owning a dog shall confine and restrain such dog by good and sufficient means, or cause such dog to be properly leashed to prevent such dog from biting any person or animal or from running at large. It is unlawful for a person to chain, tether or otherwise attach a dog to a stationary object for more than five hours during any 24-hours period.

55.04 MINIMUM CONFINEMENT AREA. It is unlawful for an owner to fail to provide a confinement area of less than the following:

55.16 VICIOUS DOG PERMITS. It is unlawful for any person to harbor or keep a vicious dog within the City without first obtaining a vicious dog permit in accordance with the following:

1. Application. The application for a vicious dog permit must include the following:

A. Certificate of Insurance issued by an insurance company licensed to do business in the State, providing personal liability insurance coverage, as in a homeowner's policy, with a minimum liability amount of \$500,000.00 for the injury or death of any person, for damage to property of others and for acts of negligence by the owner or agent in the keeping or owning of such vicious dog. Said certificate shall require notice to the City, in conformity with general City standards for certificates of insurance, in the event of underlying policy of insurance is canceled for any reason. This provision shall in no way limit monetary, damages, or other remedies to which a party may be entitled hereunder against the owner, agent, or possessor of such dog.

B. The cancellation or other termination of any insurance policy, presented to comply with this section, shall automatically revoke and terminate the permits issued under this section unless another certificate complying with this section is provided showing insurance in effect at the time of such cancellation or termination.

C. Application fee in the amount of \$100.00.

2. Notification of Changes. The owner of the vicious dog shall be required to notify the City within 24 hours of any transfer of ownership of the dog, the dog's escape or death, any change of address by the owner, or birth of offspring to the dog.

55.17 CONFINEMENT OF VICIOUS DOGS. All vicious dogs shall be securely confined within an occupied house or residence or in a securely enclosed and locked pen or kennel, except when leashed and muzzled as provided herein. Such pen, kennel, or structure must have secure sides and a secure top attached to the sides or, in lieu of a top, walls at least six feet in height and at least six feet taller than any internal structure. All pens or other structures designed, constructed, or used to confine vicious dogs must be locked with a key or combination lock when such animals are within the structure. Such structure must have a secure bottom, floor, or foundation attached to the sides of the pen or the sides of the pen must be embedded in the ground no less than two (2) feet so as to prevent digging under the walls by the confined dog. All pens must have a sign with minimum two-inch lettering saying "Beware of Vicious Dog." The County Sheriff is empowered to inspect such pens at least once per year. All structures erected to house vicious dogs must comply with all zoning and building regulations of the City. All such structures must be adequately lighted and ventilated and kept in a clean and sanitary condition. No vicious dog may be kept on a porch, patio, or in any part of a house or structure that would allow the dog to exit such building on its own volition. No person shall permit a vicious dog to go outside its kennel or pen unless such dog is securely leashed with a leash no longer than six (6) feet in length. No person shall permit a vicious dog to be kept on a chain, rope, or other type of leash outside its kennel or pen unless both dog and leash are under the actual physical control of a person 18 years of age or older. Such dogs may not be leashed to inanimate objects such as trees, posts, building, or any other object or structure. Violation of this section is a simple misdemeanor. Each day of any such violation shall constitute a separate offense.

55.18 VICIOUS DOGS AT LARGE. A vicious dog which is found to be at large and not confined as required by this chapter shall be permanently removed from the City or destroyed. A vicious dog which is permanently removed from the City but is found back in the City will be immediately destroyed.

55.19 SEIZURE, IMPOUNDMENT AND DISPOSITION OF VICIOUS DOGS, ILLEGAL ANIMALS AND DANGEROUS ANIMALS.

1. The County Sheriff, at his or her discretion or upon receipt of a complaint alleging that a particular animal is a vicious dog, illegal animal, or dangerous animal, as defined herein, may initiate proceedings to declare said animal an "offending animal." If the owner contests said designation, a hearing on the matter shall be conducted by the City Administrator. The person owning, keeping, sheltering, or harboring the offending animal in question shall be given not less than 72 hours' written notice of the time and place of said hearing. Said notice shall set forth the description of the offending animal in question and the basis for the allegation of viciousness. The notice shall also set forth that if the offending animal is determined to be vicious, illegal, or dangerous, the owner may be required to obtain a vicious dog permit, confine the animal or dispose of the animal as required by this chapter. The notice shall be served upon any adult residing at the premises where the animal is located, or may be posted on those premises if no adult is present to accept service.

2. If, after hearing, the City Administrator determines an animal is an offending animal held in violation of this chapter as set out in the notice of hearing, the City Administrator shall order the person owning, sheltering, harboring, or keeping the animal to obtain a vicious dog permit and confine the animal as required by this chapter, or remove it from the City. The order shall immediately be served upon the person against whom issued in the same manner as the notice of hearing. If the order is not complied with within three days of its issuance, the City Administrator is authorized to seize and impound the animal. An animal so seized shall be impounded for a period of seven days. If at the end of the impoundment period, the person against whom the order of the City Administrator was issued has not appealed such order to the Council, or has not complied with the order, the City Administrator shall cause the animal to be destroyed. Before being returned to the owner, an unaltered dog shall be surgically spayed or neutered, unless the dog has been duly registered for breeding purposes.

3. The order to obtain the required permit, or to confine or remove an offending animal from the City issued by the City Administrator may be appealed to the Council. In order to appeal such order, written notice of appeal must be filed with the City Administrator within three days after receipt of the order. Failure to file such written notice of appeal shall constitute a waiver of right to appeal the order to the City Administrator.

4. The notice of appeal shall state the grounds for such appeal and shall be delivered personally or by certified mail to the City Administrator. The hearing of such appeal shall be scheduled within 20 days of the receipt of notice of appeal. The hearing may be continued for good cause. After such hearing, the Council may affirm or reverse the order of the City Administrator. Such determination shall be contained in a written decision and shall be filed with the City Administrator within three days after the hearing or any continued session thereof. The hearing shall be confined to

the record made before the City Administrator and the arguments of the parties or their representatives, but no additional evidence shall be taken.

5. If the Council affirms the action of the City Administrator, the Council shall order in its written decision that the person sheltering, harboring, or keeping such offending animal shall obtain a vicious dog permit and confine said dog as required by this chapter or remove the offending animal from the City. The decision and order shall immediately be served upon the person against whom rendered in the same manner as the notice set out in subsection 1 of this section. If the original order of the City Administrator is not appealed and is not complied with within three days or the order of the Council after appeal is not complied with within three days of its issuance, the County Sheriff or his or her designee is authorized to seize and impound said offending animal. A dog so seized shall be impounded for a period of ten days. If at the end of the impoundment period, the person against whom the decision and order of the City Administrator or the Council was issued has not petitioned the County District Court for a review of said order, or has not complied with the order, the City Administrator shall cause the dog to be destroyed in a humane manner.

6. Failure to comply with an order of the City Administrator issued pursuant hereto and not appealed or of the Council after appeal, is a simple misdemeanor. Each day said failure to comply exists shall constitute a separate violation.

7. Any animal which is alleged to be an offending animal and which is under impoundment or quarantine at the animal shelter shall not be released to the owner, but shall continue to be held at the expense of the owner pending the outcome of the hearing. All costs of such impoundment or quarantine shall be paid by the owner if the dog is determined to be vicious or the animal is found to be an offending animal. If the dog is not determined to be vicious or the animal is found not to be offending, all costs shall be paid by the City except costs attributable to initial confinement prior to notice or costs of any required quarantine which shall nonetheless be paid by the owner.

55.20 KEEPING OF ILLEGAL ANIMALS PROHIBITED. No person shall keep, shelter, or harbor any illegal animal as a pet, or act as a temporary custodian for such animal, or keep, shelter, or harbor such animal for any other purpose or in any other capacity within the City except in the following circumstances:

1. The keeping of illegal animals in a public zoo, bona fide educational or medical institution, humane society or museum where they are kept as live specimens for the public to view or for the purpose of instruction, research or study.
2. The keeping of illegal animals for exhibition to the public by a bona fide traveling circus, carnival, exhibit or show.
3. The keeping of illegal animals in a bona fide, licensed veterinary hospital for treatment.
4. The keeping of illegal animals by a wildlife rescue organization with appropriate permit from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources.
5. Any illegal animals under the jurisdiction of and in the possession of the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, pursuant to Chapters 481A and 481B of the *Code of Iowa*.

If the Mayor Pro Tem performs the Mayor's duties during the Mayor's absence or disability, the Mayor Pro Tem shall be paid the Mayor's Council meeting compensation of \$50.00, plus the Mayor Pro Tem's regular Council compensation of \$60.00, and if the Mayor Pro Tem performs the Mayor's duties for a continuous period of fifteen (15) days or more, the Mayor Pro Tem shall also be paid the Mayor's monthly salary of \$333.33.
